
Estimated \$30 million cost





Conversion of stop sign and traffic signal intersections to roundabouts: 40% reduction in all crashes 80% reduction in injury crashes 90% reduction in fatal & incapacitating injury crashes

Percent difference in actual fatal crash rates during 2004-08 in 14 large cities with red light cameras vs. expected rates without cameras
